2024 Kurashiki Student Ambassador Essay: Mae Masek

The HAJAS Student Ambassador Program with Kurashiki, Japan was an experience that deeply impacted my life. As a student ambassador of the program, I met many people from America and Japan who were unbelievably kind and made this program incredible. Truly, thank you to everyone who helped assist and organize this sister city program. I hope I can share just how impactful this experience has been by sharing my memories with my host families, the Kurashiki Commercial High School visit, and the people I met through this program.

The day I arrived at Kurashiki I met my first host family, the Nakamura Family, in the train station. I was greeted enthusiastically by my host dad and sister and instantly my nerves were relieved. On the drive back home we talked about our interests and plans for the week together. I met the host mom at home and we all had an amazing time talking and laughing with each other. I loved hearing stories about how the parents met and their memories with the sister while we shared funny YouTube videos with each other. During my stay, the mom and sister showed me around Okayama to go clothes shopping, to see the sister's middle school, or to explore Okayama Korakuen. The Nakamura family was energetic and entertaining, and every day felt like a story worth telling.

After a week with the Nakamura's, it was time to pack up and meet the Ikegami family, who I'd be staying with next. I was greeted by two young girls in the family who were shy and quiet at first, but by the end of the first day they were excitedly explaining games to play with me. The mom and dad of this host family were sincere and a joy to

be around. I always enjoyed how down to earth this family was; the kids taught me games like Shogi and Karuta while the parents taught me about local food in Kurashiki. I loved looking through photo albums of the kids while the parents explained the backstory of each photo. I even learned that the host mom's family hosted a student from Kansas City thirty years ago when the mom was a kid. During my stay, the Ikegami family showed me around the Bikan Chiku area and helped me research the favorite artists that I discovered at Ohara Bijutsukan. I've learned so much about Kurashiki through this family, and I treasure the fun memories we created together.

But overall my favorite shared memory with both of my host families was seeing the ocean for the first time. With my first host family, on a weekend trip we traveled to Shodoshima and stayed at a hotel near Angel Road. We had a stunning view of the sunset, and sharing this genuine moment of peace with this family made me want to cry. The sun turned the sky a beautiful, deep pink that reflected off the waves of the ocean. Time seemed to slow down as I stood outside with my homestay sister and we watched every hue of the sunset unfold. We played a lot of fun games with them, like the card game ikyuusan (which is similar to the game Spoons). We had a great time getting to know the club members and their school as a whole. I hope that they continue to study English and can visit America soon. The friends that I made at this school were incredibly kind and fun to be with. I learned a lot about Kurashiki through them, and I hope they learned some new things about Kansas City through my own stories. I hope to keep in contact with these

students in the future and cheer them on as they are close to taking college exams soon.
